GSU COMMENCEMENT NEWS . . . Julia M. Walsh, chairman of Julia M. Walsh & Sons, Inc., Washington, and James M. Furman, vice president of John D. and Catherine MacArthur Foundation, Chicago, will receive honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degrees from GSU on June 6 and June 7, respectively, at commencement exercises for 972 undergraduate and graduate students. Ceremonies on Saturday, June 6, will honor 177 graduates of the College of Business and Public Administration; 189 from the College of Arts and Sciences; and 115 from the School of Health Professions. On Sunday, degrees will be awarded to 342 graduates from the College of Human Learning and Development; a record 144 from the Board of Governors B.A. Degree Program; and 5 from the University Without Walls B.A. Program. Walsh's career has been

COMMENCEMENT NEWS (continued) . . . filled with many "firsts." She was the first female graduate of the Advanced Management Program of the Harvard Business School; the first woman governor of the American Stock Exchange; and the first woman director of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. She founded Julia M. Walsh & Sons, Inc., in June, 1977. Furman is being honored for some 25 years of public service to education in Illinois, his native state of Ohio, and other parts of the nation. He came to Illinois following four years as director and executive coordinator of the Washington State Council on Higher Education and four years as executive officer of the Ohio Board of Regents. Each of the honorees will present the major address at their respective commencement programs. Music for the ceremonies will be presented by the GSU Community Symphonic Band under the direction of Robert Hindsley, community professor of music. The exercises will be held at 2:00 p.m. in the Gymnasium. Admission will be by ticket only.

GSU PARKING FEES REDUCED . . . Effective for the 1981 Fall Trimester, parking fees will be reduced as follows: annual decal rate from \$30 to \$25; trimester decal rate from \$11 to \$9; and daily parking will remain at \$.75. This reduction is predicated upon an annual review of parking fees in relation to enrollment increase, cost of maintenance and income.

THE UNIVERSITY . . . will be closed on Monday, May 25, in observance of Memorial Day.



BON BOYAGE GSU JAZZMEN . . . Eighteen GSU jazzmen will be among more than two dozen individuals and groups of musicians and entertainers from North and South America who will participate in the "First Week of Music of the Americas" in Sao Paulo, Brazil, from May 23 to May 30. Billed as the "Greatest musical event in the history of South America," the festival is a project of Partners of the Americas, in which Illinois and Sao Paulo are partner states. Warrick Carter and Ken Chaney, GSU music professors, will be in charge of conducting the Jazz Band. The Jazz Band will play at least seven concerts on the tour. Part of the time, they will be backing up Eartha Kitt, one of America's best known jazz singers. The purpose of the music festival is to provide a focal point for raising funds for a Research Center for the Study of the Problem of Abandoned Children at Mackenzie Institute, one of the oldest and largest private institutions of learning in Latin America. The new center will research the problem, formulate possible actions and make recommendations to public and private agencies throughout the Americas for implementation.

STUDENT RECITAL . . . LaVerne Jackson, a member of the 1981 GSU graduating class, will present a student recital around the theme "An Afternoon of Italian Opera," in the Music Recital Hall at 4:00 p.m. Sunday, May 24. The public is invited free of charge to this event. Jackson is a student of operatic singer, Anne Perillo, and is completing her studies under Rudolf Strukoff, GSU music professor. She will present works of Handel, Tosti, Respighi and Puccini, in addition to spirituals by Boatner, Burleigh, and Adams and Weatherly.

PARKING LOT RENOVATIONS . . . Repairing and resurfacing of the GSU parking lots has begun and will continue until May 29. The schedule for individual lot renovations is as follows: "A" lot--closed May 22; "B" lot--closed May 23, 26, 27; "C" lot--closed May 24, 28 and 29. It is requested that during these repairs drivers and pedestrians avoid using the parking lots. Barriers and signs will be used to indicate the restricted areas.
