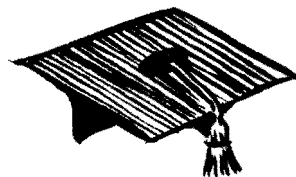

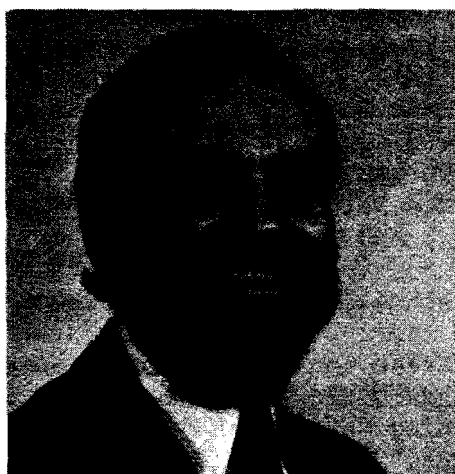

KATZ LEAVES GSU . . . William Katz, an original member of the GSU staff and most recently assistant dean of the College of Human Learning and Development (HLD), has tendered his resignation to accept the position of dean of the College of HLD at Eastern Washington University. His new appointment is effective June 15. Katz came to GSU during the academic planning year of 1970. In addition to his most recent position, he also was associate dean and twice acting dean of HLD. In his new post at the 8,000 student northwestern university, he will head the largest college, with 3700 students and a faculty of 99, of which 76 are full time.

GSU FOUNDATION INAUGURATES PLANNED GIFTS PROGRAM . . . A comprehensive planned gifts program through which a donor may receive significant tax benefits has been instituted by the GSU Foundation, according to James B. Lund, Foundation president and head of the Matteson-Richton Bank. "Donors can increase their income by making a tax-wise gift," stated Lund. "If spouses make such a gift, they can increase the after-death income available to the surviving spouse." Among the methods employed for planned or "deferred" giving are gift annuities, unitrusts, annuity trusts, gifts through life insurance, a pooled income fund, and bequests. The Foundation will market and administer all of these so-called instruments. A comprehensive brochure entitled "You and Your Security with the Governors State University Foundation: An Investment in the Future of Your Region" has been published to explain in detail the specific income, capital gains and estate tax advantages of the different instruments available to prospective donors. "A VOYAGE OF DISCOVERY" . . . into the little known art of the Pacific Islands, including Easter Island monoliths, ancient sculpture of Hawaii and exotic masks of New Guinea, will be conducted in the Multi-Media Center at GSU between June 25 and August 10. Arthur Bourgeois, professor of art history who has made a ten-year study of the subject, will teach a special class by means of authentic music, legends and multiple projection of art slides and film. The class will meet from 9:30 to 11:20 a.m. on Monday and Thursday mornings during the second half of the Spring/Summer Trimester. "Throughout this mass of islands, there existed hundreds of cultures interacting or in isolation that developed an extraordinary range of art styles to express their beliefs in spirits and supernatural forces," claims Bourgeois. LEARN TO GARDEN THE ORGANIC WAY . . . How to grow vegetables in a natural, chemical-free environment, known popularly as organic gardening, will be taught in a special six-session workshop being offered at GSU beginning on Friday, June 5. The course will include discussions of the basic organic methods and techniques as applied to garden design and preparation, cultivation practices, and pest identification and control without chemicals. Classes will meet from 9:15 a.m. to 12:00 noon in the science lab of GSU each Friday through July 10. The cost of \$20 covers registration, handouts and text.
