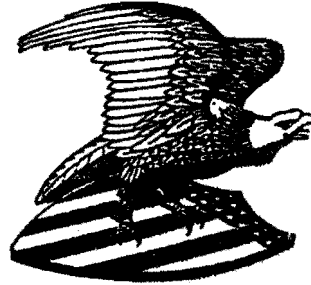

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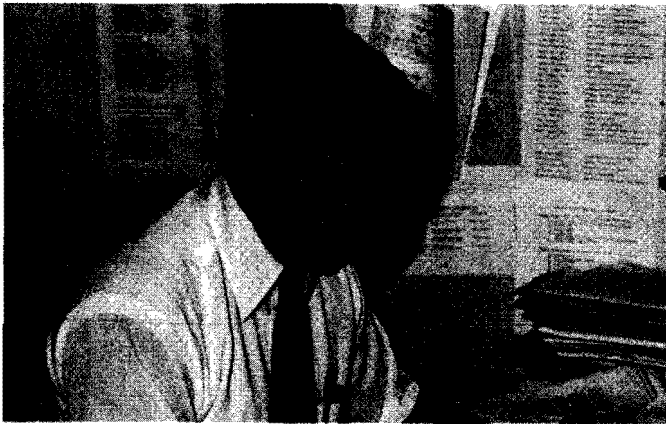

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Jazzmen to Present . . .

The GSU Jazz Ensemble, which returned on June 6 from a successful two-week tour of Brazil, will say "thank you" in music to their friends and benefactors at a special free public concert in the Music Recital Hall at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 18. As part of the "First Week of Music of the Americas," the Ensemble played nine concerts in Sao Paulo and Florianopolis before standing room only crowds. According to Warrick Carter, chairman of the Division of Fine and Performing Arts and leader of the band, Thursday's concert will consist of those numbers which proved most popular with the South American audiences. While on tour, the Jazzmen played four concerts at a local theatre, a private club called the Escola de Samba, and the University of Santa Catarina. One of the shows was taped by Global Television, a Brazilian company, for telecasting throughout Brazil in June. Attempts are being made to get a copy of the videotape for possible use in the Chicago area. "All of the American artists were given a fine reception," commented Carter. "The whole affair was an experience which will influence our boys for the rest of their lives, and we are grateful to everybody who helped make it happen."
