GSU ECONOMIC IMPACT...The State of Illinois has spent over \$10 million in the south part of the Chicago area thanks to GSU. Bill Engbretson told 200 gathered at a meeting of the South Suburban Industrial Conference in Olympia Fields Friday that some \$15 million a year will be spent in the area by the time the University moves to its permanent campus in the fall of 1973. More than money, the President pointed to the educational and social benefits GSU will provide to the area.
