



Paul M. Davis, WGN Radio, TV News Director To Lecture at GSU

Veteran Illinois broadcast newsman Paul M. Davis, who became news director of WGN radio and television in August, 1980, will be the featured lecturer October 20 for the continuing series on "The Chicago Mayoral Elections — 1983." He will lecture in Engbretson Hall at GSU at 7:30 pm. The public is invited to attend without charge.

Davis, one of the most recognized news directors in the nation, is past president of the Radio Television News Directors Association, and serves on the Board of Trustees of the Radio Television News Directors Foundation. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Chicago Headline Club and a member of the Illinois Freedom of Information Council. He holds numerous awards and distinctions, including the "Columbia-DuPont Citation" for lone journalism (1973); "Outstanding Young Man in Illinois" (1969); president, Illinois News Broadcasters Association (1967-68).

He is also the vice-chairman of the First Amendment Congress Coalition, which is made up of the nation's major print and broadcast journalism associations. He chaired that group's Philadelphia convention in January of 1980. Davis is also on the advisory

Davis is a graduate of the University of Illinois. In addition to his many professional honors, he has consistently been involved with local and state-wide charitable organizations.

GSU Presents Polish Film Course at Chicago Location

Eleven Polish films, from the silent movies to "Man of Iron," are being presented by GSU in a special course entitled "Poland in Motion Pictures." Funding Increased for GSU Office of Economic Education

In recognition of its outstanding achievements during the 1981-82 academic year, the Office of Economic Education at GSU has received a \$6,000 increase in its 1982-83 funding from the Illinois Council on Economic Education.

John Morton, director of the University office and teacher of economics at Homewood-Flossmoor High School, states that, as a result of the increase to \$17,000, funding for the OEE at Governors State is one of the two highest among the nine regional offices throughout the state. Additional funding comes from grants from area civic and business organizations and the University, which pays the director's part-time salary.

The goal of the OEE is to improve the quality and quantity of economic education in high schools. It provides seminars, workshops, lectures, consultation and instructional materials to area high schools and offers additional training for teachers of economics at the secondary level.

John Lewis, executive director of the Illinois Council on Economic Education, observed, "The center at Governors State is one of the newest in Illinois. But under John Morton's guidance, it has become one of the most active."

The deadline for the Office of Research FY83 Cycle II Mini-Grants has been extended to November 1, 1982.

One Plus Dialing

Effective 12:01 am Saturday, October 2, 1982, Illinois Bell Telephone introduced One Plus Dialing in the 231 Area Code. *There is no change in the dialing procedure for calls made within area codes 312.*

There are two dialing changes associated with One Plus Dialing.

1. Directly dialed calls from the 312 Area Code to points outside the area will be dialed: "1" plus the Area Code and the number. For example, a call which is now dialed 201-555-1234 will be dialed as 1-201-555-1234. This dialing pattern change is possible now with direct dialed 10-digit calls from all 312 exchanges.
2. Operator assisted calls within the 312 Area Code will be dialed: "O" plus the Area Code 312 and the 7-digit number. For example, a call which is now dialed 0-555-1234 will be dialed as 0-312-555-1234. The correct method of placing a long distance phone call thru the University Switchboard will be to continue to use 92-9 before dialing the "1" plus area code and phone number. Long distance telephone calls made on 91 instead of 92-9 cost the University three times the cost of a call made on 92-9.


