PROFESSOR, WRITER, POLITICAL EXPERT — THAT'S PAUL GREEN. . . Politics is his game. **Paul Green** is his name. And while the southern suburbs is his primary turf, he is one of Governors State University's best known personalities throughout Illinois.

Hardly an election year goes by that you don't see Paul Green, professor of political science at Governors State, quoted in the press. And that means the press in the larger sense—the *Chicago Tribune* and *Sun-Times*, *Arlington Heights Daily Herald*, nearly every newspaper in the southern suburbs, the *State Journal-Register*, radio and TV—you name it. He is also a well-known writer on things political from the grass roots to the national scene. He is a regular contributor to *Illinois Issues*, has published in *Illinois Business*, has contributed guest columns to the ed-op pages of both the *Tribune* and *Sun-Times*, and contributed many papers to a number of professional publications.

Nearly every time there is an election, especially one involving Chicago area politicians, you can expect to see Paul Green on television analyzing the situation. Or you might hear him in the evening on WGN radio's "Extension 720" discussing the latest trends and polls with host **Milton Rosenberg**.

Following the election of **Mayor Harold Washington** in Chicago, he organized a conference to take a look at what happened and the "why" and "how" of it. In 1983, he co-edited, and contributed to a book based on the conference proceedings, titled *The Making of the Mayor—Chicago, 1983*, which received favorable reviews in many newspapers.

But Green's interest is not limited to so-called "big-time" politics. As director of the university's Institute for Public Policy and Administration since 1980, he is well versed in every aspect of the American political scene. He has a particular fondness for government at the township level. He himself served for six years as a supervisor of Monee Township. Elected township officials throughout Illinois look forward to his annual series of seminars on township government. Each spring he stages these conferences in four or five strategic locations from one end of the state to the other. Between 600 and 800 local officials learn about the latest trends and developments from local, regional, state and federal officials.

Green came to Governors State University in 1973, which makes him one of the more "senior" veterans of innovation. He was awarded the doctor of philosophy degree from University of Chicago two years later. Earlier he had earned the master of arts at Chicago and the bachelor of arts at University of Illinois. He has been chairperson of the Division of Public Administration in the College of Business and Public Administration since 1980.

Among the many papers he has written, one of the most intriguing appeared several years ago in *Illinois Police Officer*. It was called "The Professor, the Paris Police Department, and the Prostitutes of France." What that has to do with politics only one intimately familiar with the Chicago political scene can probably say. But that may be another story.
