

**GSU PART OF "WORLD'S LARGEST CONCERT"...**On March 18, about 90 mid-grade students from three south suburban schools will come to Governors State University to participate in a concert involving more than half a million youths from coast to coast. Similar groups at hundreds of other locations will be tied together by satellite television for what is being called "The World's Largest Concert-1986." Here at Governors State, our own dish antenna will pick up the signal directly from a satellite known as Weststar IV/Transponder 9D, according to **Dr. Melvyn Muchnik** (PO).

Nationally, the program is sponsored by the Music Educators National Conference (MENC). The GSU student chapter and the Division of Fine and Performing Arts are local coordinators. At 11:30 a.m., **Maj. James E. Bankhead**, director of the U. S. Air Force Band and Singing Sergeants, will give the downbeat from Constitution Hall, Washington, D.C. Across the nation, young people will join in a program of six choral selections. In many areas, they will see the program from Washington over national public television. The singers at Governors State come from Memorial School in Tinley Park, Matteson's Huth Upper Grade Center, and Brooks Junior High School, Harvey. **Marylynn Wessel**, music teacher at Memorial School and an officer of the GSU student chapter of MENC, will direct the local singers. They will begin rehearsal in the Hall of Governors at about 10 a.m. The Governors State University family and townspeople are invited to join in this celebration commemorating national "Music in Our Schools Month."

NOTES FROM FEBRUARY 1986 BOARD MEETING

Board Reviews Tuition Paper -- Chancellor Layzell presented a background paper on tuition. The Chancellor and Presidents will bring tuition and fee recommendations to the Board at the April meeting. The information contained in Dr. Layzell's report included a three year history of financial aid, comparisons of the BOG universities' tuition and fee levels with other Illinois institutions and with other American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) institutions in the midwest, comparisons of tuition increases with increases in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) and the Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) and increases in personal income levels.

This information indicates that tuition and fee levels in the BOG System still remain relatively low when compared to other systems in Illinois and when compared to other universities in the midwest that are similar to the BOG universities. Approximately 70 percent of the students in the System are on some form of financial assistance. In addition, tuition and tuition increases have, in general, been less than CPI and HEPI increases. Finally, tuition in the BOG System is approximately 27 percent of the instructional cost which is below the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) policy that tuition should be no more than one-third of the instructional cost.

Dr. Layzell told the Board that the IBHE has recommended a six percent increase in tuition. If the Board of Governors were to adopt this recommendation, tuition would be increased approximately \$60 per academic year per student.

Board Meets With Federal Officials -- Due to the recent acquisition of a satellite dish antenna at Governors State University, the Board participated in a live discussion by satellite link with Senator Paul Simon and Dr. C. Ronald Kimberling, Acting Assistant Secretary for Postsecondary Education, of the U.S. Department of Education. The topic of the discussion was student assistance.

Senator Simon and Dr. Kimberling were in a television studio in Washington, D.C. The Board members were able to directly ask questions of the Washington officials who appeared on television screens using the satellite link.

The arrangements for the conference were made under the direction of Dr. Melvyn M. Muchnik, the university's special assistant to the president for new communications technology. The Board's discussion is described as the first time such technology has been used to provide an Illinois unit of government with the opportunity to speak directly with federal officials.

As an example of the value of philanthropy, it should be noted that the satellite dish antenna was purchased as a result of private contributions to the Governors State University Foundation and with other non-state appropriated funds.

Academic Program Matters -- The Board approved Chancellor Layzell's recommendations for four requests for reasonable and moderate extensions of existing academic programs at Eastern and Governors State and one request for a new administrative unit at Western.

At EIU, a Jazz Studies option in the existing Bachelor of Music degree program was approved.

At GSU, a request to change the names of the existing Bachelor of Arts degree program in Interpersonal Communications to the Bachelor of Arts degree program in Speech-Communication Studies and the existing minor in Interpersonal Communication to the minor in Speech-Communication Studies. Also at GSU, the Board approved a change in name of the existing Master of Arts degree program in Interpersonal Communication to the Master of Arts degree program in Communication Studies. In addition, the name of the existing Master of Health Science degree program in Alcoholism Sciences was approved to be changed to the Master of Health Science degree program in Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Sciences. The next step is for these four requests for reasonable and moderate extensions of existing academic programs to be sent to the IBHE staff.

At Western, the Board approved the Chancellor's request for a new administrative unit, the University Advising Center. The next step is for the proposal to be sent to the IBHE for review and action.

Board Approves Introduction of Appropriation Bill for Fiscal Year 1987 -- Chancellor Layzell's recommendation was approved by the Board to introduce the Board of Governors appropriation bill at the level proposed by the IBHE. That recommendation includes a FY87 operating budget of \$188,684,500 exclusive of retirement contributions. This recommendation includes \$142,859,100 from the General Revenue Fund, \$40,954,400 in the Income Fund and \$4,871,000 in the Cooperative Computer Center Revolving Fund. The IBHE recommendation provides a 10.3 percent increase over FY86 appropriations and includes a proposed 6 percent tuition increase. The BOG System was recommended to receive the highest percentage increase of any of the public systems.

Dr. Layzell also reviewed the fact that Governor Thompson recently recommended that higher education receive a 9.5 percent increase in general revenue funds for FY87. The Governor's budget recommendation is the second largest increase for higher education in almost two decades.

Report of the Board Committee on Bylaws, Policies, and Regulations - Dominick J. Bufalino, Chairman of the ad hoc Committee on Bylaws, Policies, and Regulations, reported that the Committee met on February 20, 1986 at 7:30 a.m. The Committee reviewed and approved the schedule and procedure proposed by the Chancellor. The Committee plans to meet at least once a month in conjunction with the Board meeting and plans to complete its work by December, 1986.

New Student Board Member from Chicago State -- Mrs. Kaufman welcomed Eddie Kemp to the Board. Mr. Kemp is a special education major and is in his third year at Chicago State. He replaces Derek Washington as the student representative to the Board from CSU.
