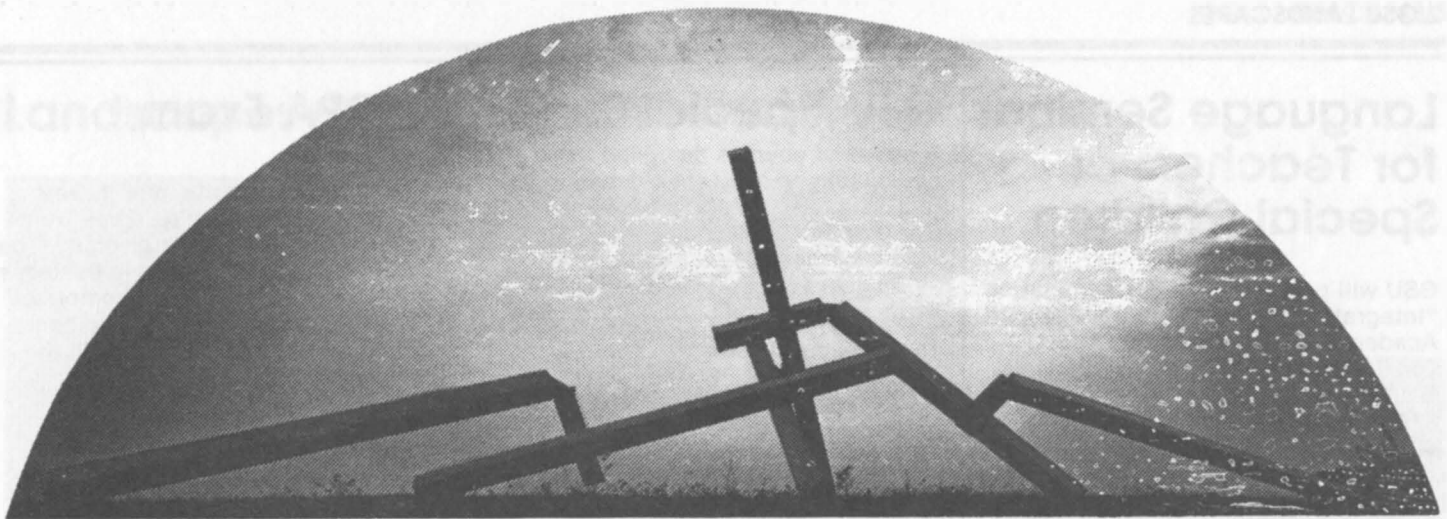

GSU Students Win National Competition

Governors State University claims what may be its first national championship in intercollegiate competition — on the scholastic level.

Four graduate students of the School of Health Professions have won the third annual Hospital Financial Management and Regulation Computer Simulation Game held during the national convention of the American College of Hospital Administrators in Chicago on March 1-4.

Diane Barowsky, Oak Forest; Candace St. Lawrence, of Mercy Hospital and Medical Center, Chicago; Lynda Reese, of St. Mary's Hospital, Gary; and Jack Weiss, in residency training in Buffalo, won the title in competition with teams from the University of North Carolina - Chapel Hill and the University of Arizona.

The GSU students previously had defeated teams from the University of Michigan, University of Chicago, Xavier (Ohio) University, Trinity University and Baylor University to reach the championship competition. (See *Landscapes*, February 18.)

The students participated in four rounds of computer games and appeared in two public hearings. During the four-day meeting, they demonstrated proficiency in technical financial decisions, meeting

community service needs, and the decision making process and oral presentation. Their faculty advisor in the contest was Brian Malec, university professor of health services administration.

Malec, reported that, "The superiority of our team was a result precisely of the special character of the GSU student: older, employed, married. While our competitors were equal to us in 'book learning,' they could not match us in wisdom — a wisdom

earned through experience and maturity."

"This remarkable achievement," stated President Leo Goodman-Malamuth, "confirms what we have contended for years at Governors State University — we have a uniquely talented and challenging student body."

A reception for GSU's champions will be held on Monday, March 21, in the E Wing Lounge from 3 to 6 pm. The public is invited.

Language Seminar for Teachers of Special Children

GSU will present a two-day seminar on "Integrating Functional Language with Academic Programming" on March 25-26 at the Harvey Holiday Inn, 17100 South Halsted. Hours are 9:00 am to 5:00 pm on both days.

The workshop is designed especially for: speech-language clinicians; teachers of learning disabled children; reading, math and hearing impaired resource teachers; classroom teachers of mainstreamed children and teachers of educable mentally handicapped students.

Topics will include: relationship between language, reading and math; identification of related language and reading; intervention strategies for reading and math concept knowledge, verbal problem solving performance, and reading and math processing; evaluating the effectiveness of a program and monitoring student progress.

The instructors are Dr. Barbara Culatta and Donna Horn. Culatta is an associate professor at the University of Kentucky. As a language consultant she has developed training programs emphasizing interdisciplinary implementation. Horn is a doctoral candidate in cognitive psychology and maintains a practice in speech pathology emphasizing the integration of language and reading.

One hour of graduate credit for the seminar is available to students who qualify. Credit seeking participants must attend both days. Noncredit participants may attend both days or Friday only. GSU Special Series for CPA Exam

A series of courses designed specifically to meet the educational requirements for taking the Illinois Certified Public Accounting (CPA) exam has been announced by Robert Milam, GSU dean of the College of Business and Public Administration.

The Professional Careers in Accounting Series consists of nine college-level courses which will be offered over a 45-week period. In addition, there will be a career planning day, a two-day professional accounting workshop and an eight-week CPA review. The entire series will take 54 consecutive weeks. All courses have been approved by the Board of Certified Public Accountants for the

State of Illinois.

To be eligible, students must have a minimum of a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university. The degree does not have to be in business or accounting. Each course completed successfully will earn the participants three hours of academic credit in the College of Business and Public Administration at GSU.

Three GSU Professors to Lecture in India

Three university professors have been invited to present a series of lectures on statistical quality control before top management groups in India in March.

Robert Hart, BPA professor of statistical quality control, and his wife, Marilyn, BPA professor of statistics, will conduct the seminars based on the theories and practices of Dr. W. Edwards Deming. They will be assisted by Z. A. Malik, BPA professor of management, who arranged for the seminars in his native land.

The GSU team of experts will be the guests of Bharat Heavy Electricals, Ltd. (BHEL), of New Delhi, one of the largest manufacturers of electrical equipment in the world, and of Maruti, Inc., an automobile company being set up by the Indian government in collaboration with Suzuki of Japan. They will leave on March 13 and return early in April.

The Harts are recognized as leading exponents of the Deming methods, which are credited with propelling Japan to the forefront of production quality. They have presented seminars in some of the leading companies in the U.S., including Ford, General Motors, TRW and A. O. Smith. In India, they and Malik will conduct two-day seminars for top management groups at three BHEL facilities and one at Maruti. Others may be arranged during their stay in India.

University officials state that this trip is being financed entirely by the Indian hosts. No state or federal funds are involved.

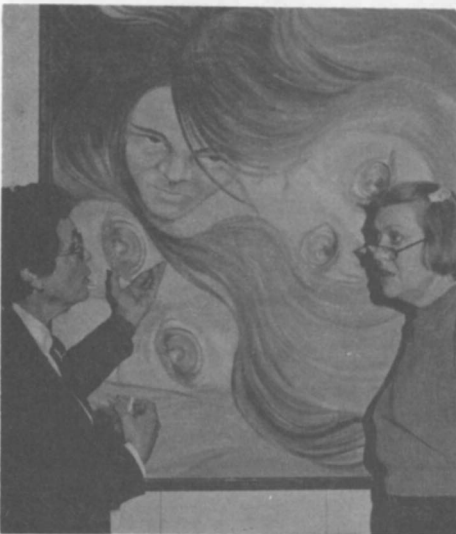

Visual Arts Gallery, E Wing Lounge.

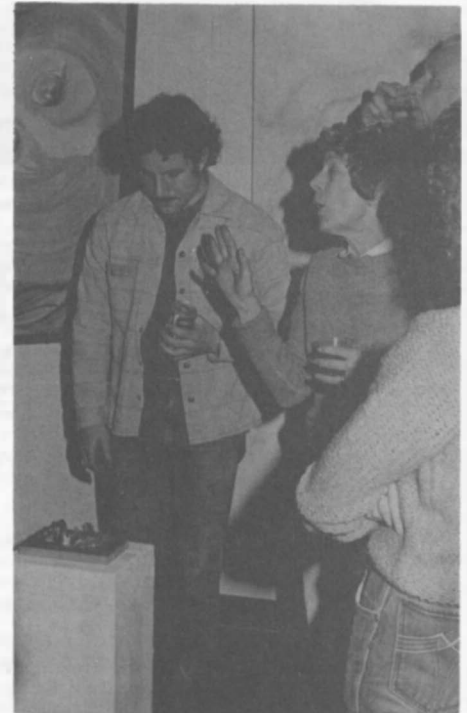


Art student, left, attempts to explain her painting theme to another Visual Arts student, Betty Evans.

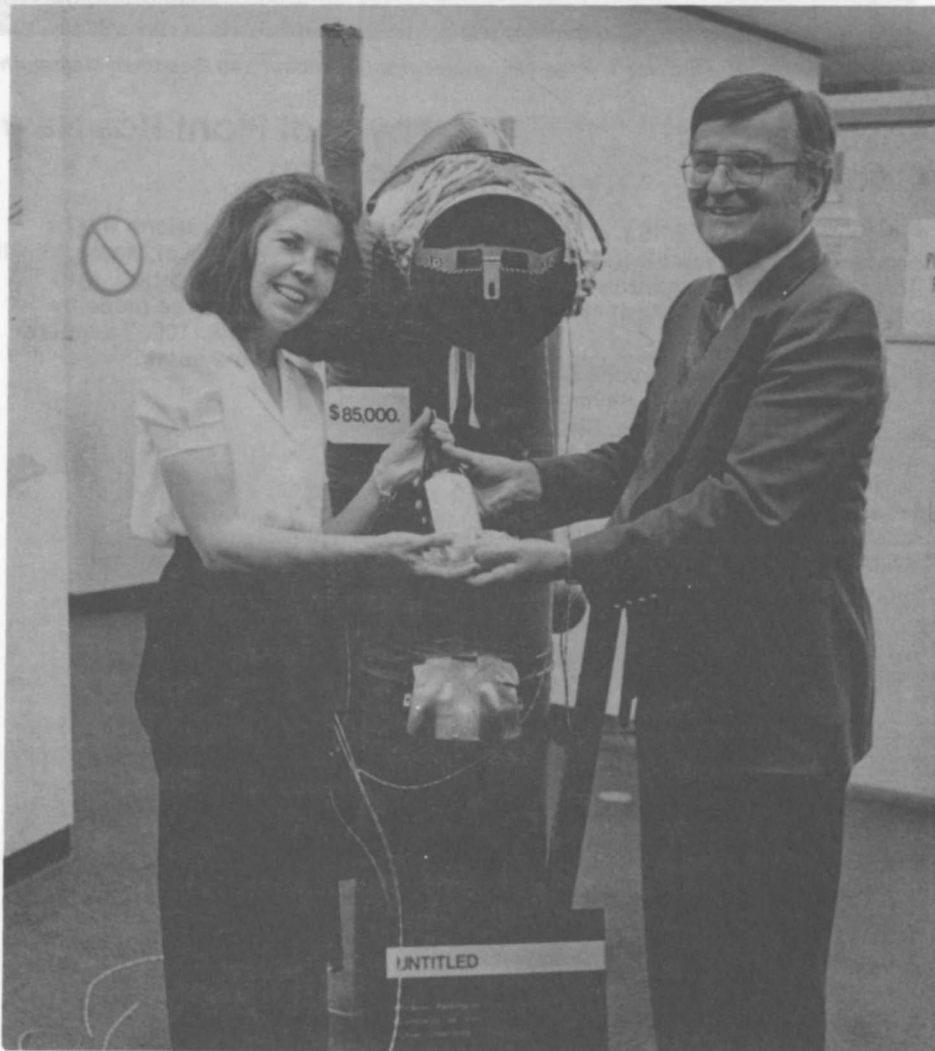
