Library catalog system goes through 'natural evolution'

"The times they are a-changin'," at the Governors State University Library, and in the true spirit of modern technology, library director Dr. Harvey Varnet thinks it's about time.

The change is significant to all GSU library patrons. It includes the demise of more than 2 million index cards from the now passe card catalog system and the introduction of a new computer system that allows patrons to search the collections of more than 800 Illinois libraries.

"It is natural evolution," says Varnet of the new computerized

card catalog. "The card catalog was a monster and only 80 percent accurate. It has had its time."

Although those who do not understand the computerized system may also view it as a monster, Varnet feels that, with the help of a trained library staff, a transition phase, and the relative ease of the computer's operation, patrons will adjust quickly to the new method of finding library materials.

The transition to the computerized system included a "freeze" on filing index cards in the card catalog as of January. Eventually the cards will be put in storage. The computers are now in operation with instructions posted on each terminal.

Library makes significant changes in system

Varnet emphasizes that the staff is available to answer questions or provide individualized training sessions.

The system itself is known as ILLINET Online (IO). It is not only exciting, but also cost effective and provides GSU library patrons with information on books, magazines, audio and video recordings, and other types of materials from the 800 Illinois libraries included in the system.

Connected to the IO system is the Illinois Library Computer Systems Organization (ILCSO). Along with

GSU, ILCSO is a shared network of 35 academic libraries, 18 library system headquarters and the Illinois State Library share more than 20 million books for 11 million people. And you can hook up your home computer to IO.

The statewide book delivery system should also receive credit for the system's success, says Varnet. Today Illinois has the third largest book delivery system in the world.

"We have to rely on each other," Varnet noted. "The belief that books are for the people is shared by all of us."

Paying the annual \$30,000 IO mem-

bership fee is actually cost effective when compared to what otherwise could be spent for maintaining records in the system, annual maintenance, the cost of numbering millions of index cards and missing books, Varnet explained.

He believes using IO is valuable from an educational point of view, and it is a better service for all GSU patrons.

"We at GSU provide access without a cost inhibitor," says Varnet. "People don't get stonewalled. We never try to tell you to find another library. We're not a public library, but we're a library that serves the public academically."

calls for a crushed stone walkway around the lake interspersed with benches and plantings.

During the 2 p.m. ceremony Sunday two areas will be dedicated to these staff members and plaques will be placed in the gardens in their memory.

Dr. Baysore, one of GSU's original staff members, died in October 1988 following a battle with cancer. His work and dedication in organizing the university began in 1970 when he was named assistant to the president.

In 1975 he was named assistant vice president for research and innovation and coordinator of regional accreditation activities. He was responsible for curriculum realignment and worked

with the North Central Association on GSU's first accreditation.

In 1977 Dr. Baysore was named associate vice president of institutional research and planning, and in 1986 he was named associate vice president of academic affairs.

Barbara Smith's untimely death in March 1989 ended a long career at GSU. A librarian by profession, Barbara started in the GSU Library in 1974. She later worked in the office of Special Programs and Continuing Education and twice served as acting dean of SPCE.

In August 1985 she joined the Provost's Office as coordinator of community college relations, a position she held until her death.

A great lover of the outdoors, Bar-

bara often returned to her native Colorado for walks in the Rockies.

The generous donations of friends, co-workers and Barbara's husband, **Dick Smith**, are making these gardens possible. **Dr. Virginio Piucci**, vice president of administration and planning, explained.

As other donations become available, additional gardens and benches around the lake will be dedicated to persons who have died while on staff at GSU.
