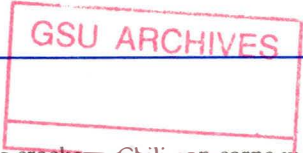

Tuesday—Old fashioned bean soup w/1 pkg crackers; Chili con carne w/1 pkg crackers; Entree: Breaded pork cutlet w/brown gravy; Sloppy Joe on bun; Stewed tomatoes and zucchini; Whipped potatoes. Wednesday—Cream of spinach soup w/1 pkg crackers; Chili con carne w/1 pkg crackers; Entree: Veal cutlet parmesan; French dip beef on roll; Medley vegetables; Whipped potatoes. Thursday—Minestrone soup w/1 pkg crackers; Chili con carne w/1 pkg crackers; Entree: Baked meat loaf; Creamed turkey over noodles; Peas and carrots; Whipped potatoes. 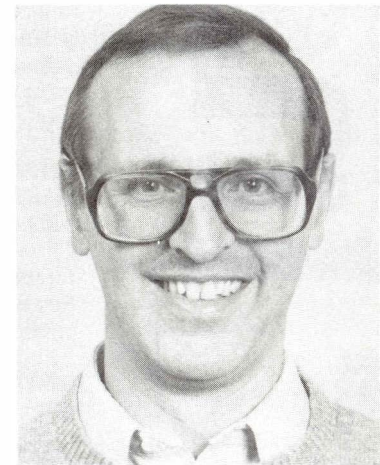

AINSWORTH—SPECIALIST IN EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY...Dr. David Ainsworth is coordinator of instructional development in the Instructional Communication Center at Governors State. He first joined the staff in 1972. During 1976-77, he took a leave of absence to serve as director of the Chicago Metropolitan Higher Education Council. CMHEC is a consortium of post-secondary educational institutions seeking ways to increase cooperation in delivering instruction to the non-campus-based student.

Dr. Ainsworth returned to the university for two years before taking another leave of absence from 1979-81 as a UNESCO specialist in educational technology. He was assigned to the Ministry of Education of the Cross River State, Nigeria.

In 1961 he earned the master of arts degree with honors from the University of St. Andrews in Scotland, and in 1970 was awarded the doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Southern California.

With his wife, **June**, and three children, **Campbell**, **Russell** and **Nell**, he lives in Flossmoor.

NOTES NOTES FROM THE OCTOBER 1986 BOARD MEETING

Malpass Announces Retirement -- Western Illinois University (WIU) President, Leslie F. Malpass, announced his resignation for the purpose of retirement, effective July 31, 1987. Malpass began his presidency at WIU in 1974, and has the longest tenure of any Illinois public university President.

The Board approved Chancellor Thomas D. Layzell's recommendation to grant a terminal leave to President Malpass. The terms of the leave provide for six months at full salary for the period of September 1, 1987 through February 28, 1988. During this time, Malpass said he intends on writing a history of the BOG System.

As she accepted Malpass' resignation, BOG Chairman, Nancy Froelich, praised him for his work at WIU.

"His contributions to higher education, the BOG System, WIU and the city of Macomb will be long remembered," she said.

Chancellor Layzell said Malpass will leave many legacies behind at WIU.

"Les has been tireless in his pursuit of the advancement of this university. Another of his hallmarks is his commitment to academic quality. He has pushed for that since the first day he walked on this campus. And finally, he and Winona have been good neighbors to the community and have been very active in community affairs, bringing a great deal to the Macomb area.

Board Approves Presidential Search Guidelines -- Guidelines for the search for a new President of WIU call for Chancellor Layzell to manage and direct the search process and to present up to six candidates to the Board for final interview by the June, 1987 meeting. The recommendation also calls for the establishment of a Campus Advisory Committee to advise the Chancellor during the selection process. The committee is to be formed by December 15, 1986.

Labor Agreements Approved -- The Board approved labor agreements affecting approximately 445 employees in the BOG System. Agreements were reached with the following unions:

-Teamsters Local #743, representing approximately 156 employees in various clerical and technical classifications at Chicago State University (CSU).

-Teamsters Local #743, representing approximately 125 employees in various clerical and technical classifications at Governors State University (GSU).

-American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) Council 31 on behalf of Local 417, representing approximately 162 employees in custodial classifications at WIU.

The salary increases in these agreements range from approximately 5.5 percent to approximately 6.5 percent.

Academic Program Matters -- The Board approved Chancellor Layzell's request for reasonable and moderate extensions of academic programs at Eastern Illinois University (EIU). Among the changes approved was the consolidation of four existing options: Business Education, Comprehensive Basic Business, Comprehensive Secretarial and Comprehensive Vocational Business Education into two options: Comprehensive Business Education and Business Education with

Second Teaching Field in the existing Bachelor of Science in Education degree program in Business Education.

The next step is for the proposals to be sent to the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) for review and action.

Honorary Degree Candidates for 1986-87 -- The Board approved the Presidents' recommendations to award Honorary Doctorates to the following people during the 1986-87 academic year: At CSU: (1) Shui-teh Hsu, Mayor of Taipei, capital city of the Republic of China (Taiwan), educator and author; (2) Carlos Morales, Vice President of the Dominican Republic and Chief Executive Officer of Central Romana Corporation, a sugar company which is the country's largest private corporation and employer; and (3) Gwendolyn Brooks, poet and educator, Poet Laureate of Illinois. At WIU: (1) C.T. Vivian, Chairman of the board of the Black Action Strategies and Information Center and a WIU alumnus. A second honorary degree may be presented by WIU during the spring commencement pending confirmation by the recommended recipient.

Capital Priority List -- The Board approved its capital priority list for Fiscal Year 1988 (FY88). The number one priority on the BOG's capital priority list is a \$6.4 million request for remodeling and additions to Coleman Hall at EIU, which would consolidate most of the operations of the EIU College of Business into one building. Other top priorities on the list include roof rehabilitation at WIU, site improvement at CSU, building renovation at Northeastern Illinois University and site improvements at GSU. The BOG's list of 21 capital projects will now be sent to the IBHE, where a master priority list of all higher education development projects will be developed and sent to the Governor.

Comprehensive Computer Plans -- A summary of the BOG's Comprehensive Computer plans was presented to the Board. The summary provided an overview of the current and planned uses of computers in the BOG System. Currently, there are more than 1,830 microcomputers and terminals available to students and faculty at the five BOG universities, with five year projections indicating that this number will more than double by Fiscal Year 1992.

Cownie Honored -- Board member, Evelyn Kaufman, presented a resolution honoring John Cownie, who served as Acting President of Northeastern from December 5, 1985 to September 15, 1986. The resolution expressed the Board's profound gratitude and appreciation for Cownie's work as Acting President.

ad hoc Committee on Bylaws, Policies and Regulations -- Dominick J. Bufalino, Chairman of the Committee, reported that the Committee met prior to the Board meeting to discuss the proposed revisions to Sections 2 and 6 of the Board regulations concerning faculty, administrative and civil service employees and physical facilities. The committee anticipates presenting the proposed revision to Section 2 for first reading at the December 4 meeting.

Revised Calendar for FY87 Board Meetings -- The Board approved a revision in the calendar for Board meetings. The change calls for the January meeting to be held at GSU and the February meeting to be held at CSU.
