HOLIDAY ENTERTAINMENT, DEC. 10... Wednesday, Dec. 10, the Talala Elementary School Choir of Park Forest, under the direction of **Donna Strukoff**, will present a short concert of holiday music in the Hall of Governors at 2 p.m. All are invited to attend, and there will be no charge.

GSU-COMMUNITY CHORALE WINTER CONCERT PRESENTS CHRISTMAS ORATORIO... Fifty-eight singers will recreate the brilliant choral music of Camille Saint-Saens at the annual winter concert of the Governors State University-Community Chorale on Dec. 7 at 4 p.m. in the Music Recital Hall.

The chorale and 28-piece string orchestra, under the direction of **Dr. Rudolf Strukoff** (CAS), will present *Christmas Oratorio* which was written by Saint-Saens in 1858 and reveals the composer's virtuosity in combining rich harmonies based on a selection of text taken from Scriptures. Soloists will be **Karen Blunk, Elizabeth Blake, Henry Hunt and Jack Van Eck**.

As is demonstrated by this composition, the French composer was well versed in the Scriptures. The music creates a naive yet joyous and sometimes solemn mood. Saint-Saens' music was underestimated for years, but today it is considered, especially his sacred music, among the best produced in the nineteenth century.

Attendance is by reservation only, and the cost of the concert is \$5. GSU students are admitted free. To reserve your seat, please call Governors State University, Division of Fine and Performing Arts at 534-5000, extension 2454.

COMPOSERS' CONCERT SCHEDULED FOR DEC. 13... A Composers' Concert of new works and electronic music will be presented at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 13 at the university. The concert will be held in the Music Recital Hall. Works include *Three Miniatures for Clarinet and Piano* by Polish composer **Krzystof Penderecki**, a renowned 20th century composer. Performing his work will be **Donna Lowe** (FA) of Park Forest on piano and **Jerry Luzeniecki** of Bradley on clarinet.



A multi-media presentation titled *Aquacade 1986* by **Dr. Richard McCreary** (CAS) and **Paul Schranz** (CAS) will be presented that evening. The electronic music is coordinated to a slide presentation of the facets of water. A second multi-media presentation that evening will be a slide show by **Dr. Joyce Morishita** (CAS) with an accompanying score for double bass and electronic tape, with computer assistance by McCreary and Schranz. A fourth piece, *Q8189+4168, Tavah's Quasar* by **Beverly D'Albert** and other GSU students, will feature their electronic computer music reflecting the passing of Halley's Comet. Other pieces composed at the university will also be performed. The public is welcome to attend this free concert.

DEC. 14—COMMUNITY SYMPHONIC BAND PERFORMANCE...The GSU-Community Symphonic Band, under the direction of **Dr. Charles Hicks** (CAS), will present a concert of classical, contemporary and holiday music at 4 p.m. on Dec. 14 at the GSU Theatre. Included in the program will be a narration of *'Twas the Night before Christmas* by **Dr. Leo Goodman-Malamuth**. Dr. Hicks will lead the band as they perform works by Bach and Beethoven; selections from the musical *Cats* and a host of Christmas carols. This concert is free, and the public is welcome.

MUDDY WATERS, RECEPTION AND SHOW PRESENTED IN INFINITY GALLERY...A reception and showing of photographs, videotapes and photojournalism projects completed by students at the university during a summer field trip up the Mississippi River will take place on Dec. 5 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. in Infinity Gallery.

The Mississippi River field trip, which is offered every other year at the university, was made in conjunction with the course, Media Team Field Project. The course provides hands-on experience to television, journalism and photography students. Twenty-five students with instructor **Jay Boersma** (CAS) traveled up the Mississippi River from July 20 to 27, stopping at Fountain City, Wis. and Winona, Minn.

Boersma, who is also the coordinator of the reception and show, said that, "*Muddy Waters* includes unique manipulated photos as well as standard documentary photographs depicting the full spectrum of life along the northern region of the Mississippi River. We welcome the general public from the surrounding communities to join us for the reception and show."

NOVEMBER EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH CHOSEN...Congratulations to **Evelyn Pegues**, secretary in the College of Business and Public Administration, who was chosen as the November Civil Service Employee of the Month. Evelyn started her career at the university almost 15 years ago as a secretary in what was formerly the College of Environmental and Applied Sciences.
