**NEW ART GALLERY SHOW, JAN. 12-29...**Works by mixed media artist **Ann Scott** will be on display in the GSU Art Gallery from Jan. 12 through 29, according to **Dr. Joyce Morishita** (CAS), coordinator of the showing. Scott uses wax, ink wash, oil pastel, acrylic and graphite to create textured, tactile surfaces.

A trained graphics artist, Scott grew up in Pennsylvania where she studied nursing. She was a registered nurse for six years before discovering her art talents after taking a studio course. The artist went on to earn a master's degree in fine arts from Michigan State University in 1980 where she also served as a teaching assistant in advanced lithography, advanced etching, introductory etching and life drawing.

In fall 1980, Scott moved to San Antonio where she turned her interests to drawing and started mixed media work by screening wet handmade paper pulp onto sheets of paper coated with thin glue. The end result resembled aerial views of landscapes or topographical features on relief maps. She moved back to the Midwest in 1983 and is placing greater emphasis on the use of vibrant colors in drawings. Her works can be viewed at the GSU Art Gallery from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Mondays through Thursdays.

NOTES FROM DECEMBER 1986 BOARD MEETING

Presentation on Northeastern's Involvement in Saving Lake Michigan -- Dr. Charles L. Shabica, Chairman of the University's Earth Science Department, made a presentation on the erosion problem and the work being done by the Chicago Lakefront Task Force, which he heads, in finding ways to reduce damage and save beaches and buildings.

Chairman Froelich expressed the Board's pride in having Dr. Shabica and Northeastern at the forefront of resolving a major issue.

1986 Collective Bargaining Concluded -- The Board approved Chancellor Thomas D. Layzell's recommendation regarding a labor agreement with Teamsters Local #743 representing approximately five employees in the maintenance labor classification at Governors State University (GSU). The overall wage agreement for this contract represents a total cost increase of 6.25 percent to the current base salary.

The Chancellor announced that with the Board's approval of this contract, the 1986 bargaining season is ended. All 21 of the civil service contracts in the System have been negotiated by Joel Schunk, Assistant Vice Chancellor for Non-academic Employee Relations, in conjunction with university staff. The Board's action on the current fiscal year's labor agreements provided average base salary increases of 5 to 5 1/2 percent with individual bargaining unit adjustments consistent with market needs and the System's resources.

Fine Arts Insurance to be Purchased -- The Chancellor advised the Board that its self-insurance fund be limited to liability insurance coverage. The Board then approved Dr. Layzell's proposal to purchase insurance for the University's fine arts at a cost of approximately \$5,200 to each university.

Academic Program Matters -- The Board acted on two recommendations for academic program changes. At Eastern Illinois University, the proposal to change the name of the Department of Speech Pathology and Audiology to the Department of Communication Disorders and Science was approved. At Western Illinois University, the proposal to eliminate the Botany option and the Zoology option in the existing Master of Science degree program was also approved.

The next step is for the proposals to be sent to the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) for review and action.

Enrollment Increases at all five BOG Universities -- Chancellor Layzell told the Board that the Fall 1986 enrollment for the BOG System shows an increase of 1,627 students or 3.6 percent over Fall 1985 enrollment. The Illinois public universities as a whole show a 1.4 percent increase. The second, third and fourth highest increases for the State are at Governors State University (GSU), Chicago State University (CSU) and Northeastern. The total current enrollment for the BOG System is 46,697 students.

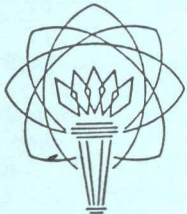

Oral Proficiency Legislation -- Dr. Layzell indicated that he would prepare a report for the Board on the impact of the law that was recently adopted to require state universities to establish an oral proficiency program for instructors. The Chancellor also said initial assessments are that there would not be much of a problem in the BOG System in implementing the legislation.

Bufalino Reports on ad hoc Committee on Board Bylaws, Policies and Regulations -- Dominick J. Bufalino, Chairman of the Committee, told the Board that the Committee approved the proposed amendments of Section II of the Board Regulations. These amendments were adopted by the full Board at the December meeting for first reading. The proposed amendments will be distributed to faculty, staff and student groups at each university for review and comment as required by Board Regulations. In the meantime, Mr. Bufalino said the Committee will continue its work.

Council of Faculties Presents Report on Quality -- Dr. Ray A. Meyerholtz, EIU, Chairman of the Council of Faculties, presented the report entitled "Quality and the University" to the Board. Nancy Froelich, Chairman of the Board, commended the Council for its work and said that she strongly supported the conclusions of the study especially the need to improve communications with campus constituencies, building these constituencies and marketing academic services effectively.

But above all, the BOG torch illuminates our System's scholarly activities, including research, which are essential components of high quality teaching.
