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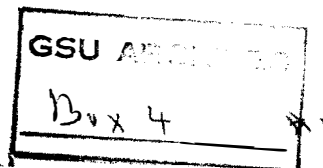

DEDICATION SHAPING UP...Watch for details of the Dedication Festivities in Faze I. The calendar for Dedication events is now being finalized. The kickoff April 20 event begins at 1:30 p.m. with the 90 minute program including a blend of traditional and the new with an academic procession of GSUers and representatives from other universities, the GSU Chorale, the Jazz Ensemble, a multi-media presentation and Governor Dan Walker's formal dedication of Phase I. A reception follows in the Hall of Governors (all living former governors of Illinois have been invited for the day), with an invitational performance of Noel Coward's "Blithe Spirit" (directed by Al Sherman) set for a 4:30 p.m. matinee.

Other Dedication events include an EAS Community College Exposition and symposium, a host of EAS events including a nature walk and plant-in workshops by HLD, a new Media festival sponsored by SSAC and the Mass Media area of emphasis in CS, a variety of recreational activities by the HLD Recreative Studies program, a Third World Studies workshop, a Municipal Governments Day and a Collegial Community Council Day, and an Alumni Drop-in.

The University will be on display during the week of April 20 with the Colleges and various units hosting open houses for the public in evening hours and on weekends. Also in the works is a survival week in May. Watch also in Faze I for announcement of a couple of social events April 19 and April 26. Then there's "Project Time Capsule." Stay tuned folks.

MAJOR DEDICATION EVENTS...in offing include SSAC sponsored showing of "Clockwork Orange" in the Multi-media Dome, Watergate Figure; James McCord; and in a double bill, Dick Gregory and the Ramsey Lewis Trio. The Dedication Committee has speakers invitation going to dynamic judiciary committee member, Rep. Barbara Jordan (unconfirmed), former U. N. Ambassador and Supreme Court Justice, Arthur Goldberg (confirmed) and fiery Washington, D. C., Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Barbara Sizemore (unconfirmed).

THE TEMPERATURE OF THINGS TO COME...or... DEDICATION FUNDING...is being provided for centralized activities by a modest fund-raising effort. The money is generally tabbed for major speakers, the formal event itself and for publications (invitations, a commemorative piece, dedication calendar, and individual programs).

Joan is a CS student, has received one M.S. in Language and the Human Condition, and is about to receive another in the Mass Media area of emphasis in CS. About 120 issues of FAZE I were edited by MEL MUCHNIK who recently joined the CS faculty. It was he who named the light/informative newsletter after Dave Schuelke in 1971 began what was then known as "Tearsheet." Mel then edited FAZE I followed by ELAINE STRAUSS, MARY LOU CAMPBELL, and then Mel again whose last year and a half of editing brought his total number of pages to over 400.

GRANTED...WILLIAM MAYO (EAS) has announced that two grants have been awarded to the American Society for Ecological Education. Dr. Mayo is president of the Society that recently moved its national offices to GSU. The grants will be used for the development of a teacher's Environmental Workshop to be held J-A '75 at GSU as an eight/unit module. Students will be recruited nation-wide for this major graduate level workshop sponsored jointly by GSU and the Society.

Universal Oil Products Co. of Des Plaines, Ill. awarded a grant of \$5,000 and McDonalds Corp. of Oak Brook has contributed \$3,000. Further support is being sought for the project.

"RAPE: AN INQUIRY"...titles a free public workshop sponsored by the GSU Dept. of Public Safety to be presented Mar. 4 and 5, 7:30 p.m., in the Community Conference Room. The workshop, coordinated by CAROLYN MOORE (DPS) will offer presentations, discussions, movies and literature. Among the speakers will be Edna Epstein of the Cook County State's Attorney Office; Sgt. Ray Hartman, Chicago Hts. Police Dept.; black belt and social worker, Dennis Perdue; and a representative of "Chicago Women Against Rape". A documentary entitled "Rape: A Preventative Inquiry" which interviews rapists in a penitentiary and several rape victims will open the workshop.

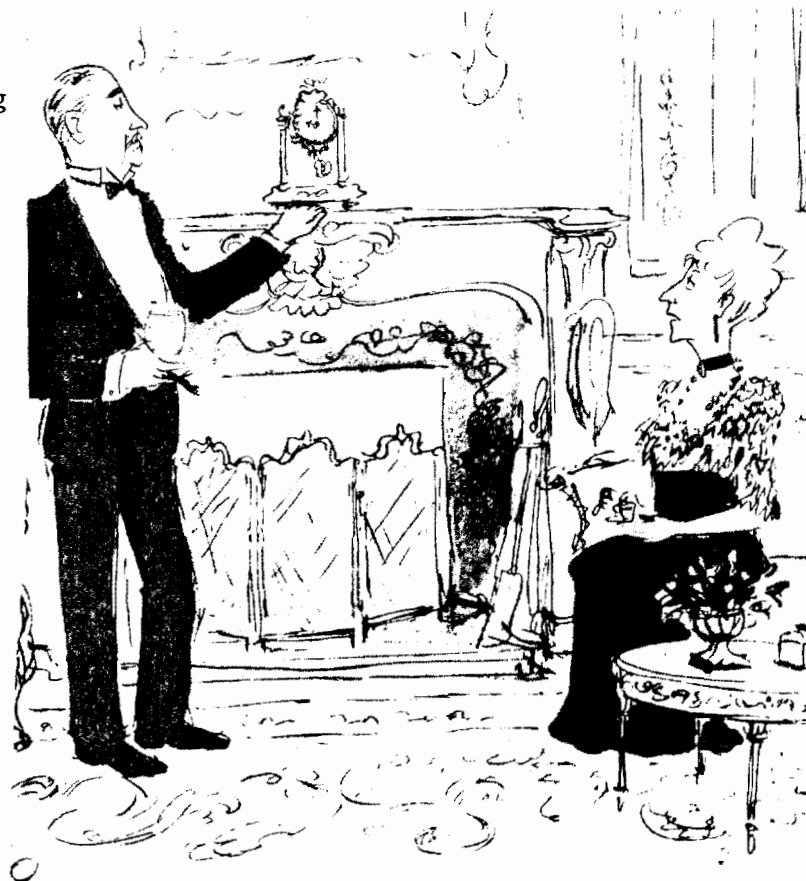

The World as a Village

If world population is condensed proportionally to a village of 1000 persons, 570 are Asian, 190 European, 100 African, 90 North American (60 in U.S.) and 50 are South American. Seven hundred of the 1000 villagers are non-white. Five hundred are hungry all the time and half that number are so malnourished they are deteriorating daily. Eight hundred live in shacks or huts less adequate than facilities provided for our farm animals. The sixty U.S. citizens receive almost half of the village total income. The remainder is divided quite unequally among the other 940.—Mr. D. E. Shaughnessy in AID. He was a member of the U.S. group participating in the November World Food Conference.

Soybean products, oil and protein, are not available to those 500 hungry in the village representing the World condensed to 1000 persons. The U.S. farmer is willing to invest his management, labor and resources to produce more food for more people if the additional production does not reduce his profits.
