BOG COUNCIL OF FACULTIES: ELECTION OF ALTERNATES... Vacancies exist for the position of alternate in both the three and one year terms for GSU reps to the BOG Council of Faculties. At present GSU representatives to the BOG Council of Faculties are: serving for three years, Dale Max (BPS); serving for two years, Addison Woodward (HLD) and alternate Robert Kelly (BPS), completing his last year, Michael Cohen (BPS). Petitioning for these two positions will begin on Wednesday, October 15. Petitions are available from the Office of University Relations. Those eligible to run, sign petitions, and vote in the elections are full-time collegial budgeted faculty members, excluding deans and assistant deans. Candidates must have served GSU in a full-time capacity for a minimum of two consecutive years. Each candidate must obtain signatures of 5% of the eligible faculty, i.e., eight signatures. Completed petitions must be returned to UR no later than 9:00 a.m., Wednesday, October 29, 1975. Ballots will be mailed to eligible faculty members on Thursday, October 30, to be returned to Bill Dodd no later than 9:00 a.m., Thursday, November 13, 1975. Election deadlines will be posted at faculty mailboxes in each College (in BPS in centrally located areas) and will appear in FAZE I.

BOG CANCELS... The Board of Governors regular monthly meeting on October 15 and 16 at Eastern Illinois University has been cancelled. The next regular meeting will be at NIU on November 19 and 20.

THE COMMITTEE CONSIDERS... The following items of shared concern are being considered by the Committee to Study GSU Organization and Administrative Functioning (in no order of priority).

- The philosophy and mandates of the University: have they been operationalized?
- The internal and external criteria used to test the system.
- Is the University at present organized to meet student-life needs?
- The present organizational structure: strength and weaknesses. How does our clientele perceive us?
- A look at the 4 Colleges as organized.
- Communication systems among students, faculty, administration, and the community.
- How do conflicting sub-systems work to frustrate our purposes?
- The reward system--how does it work: Professional Personnel Systems, faculty/college workload, reward as control.
- The budgetary systems: how organized?
- Role development and expectations: students, faculty, administration, and community.
- The prioritization process: the above list is not considered all-inclusive, but merely points of departure. Anybody who wants a say will be listened to. Next meeting, OPEN TO ALL, is Tues., Oct. 21, BPS Conference Room, or contact Mary Ella Robertson and/or Daniel Bernd, internal co-chairpersons.

AN URBAN ENGLISH EDUCATION PROGRAM...at GSU has been reviewed and recommended for approval by the Ill. State Teacher Certification board. Alma Walker, CCS, initiated the proposal to conduct an approved (6-12) urban English education program in CCS, leading to the standard high school certificate.

A unique aspect of the program is the concentration on language functions within the culture and society with emphasis upon ethnic literature from the particular Black- and Spanish-speaking populace of many urban environments. The program also includes those literary works and traditions conventional to a teacher-education program and school curricula.
