QA ON CS...Q. Who can request reclassification or reallocation of a position?

A. According to rule 3.5a, such a request may originate with the employee/or the employer. When material changes occur in the duties and responsibilities of a position, the employer/employee shall recommend to the Director in writing the reallocation or reclassification of the position to its appropriate class, and the Director shall act upon it, and shall notify the employer of his action.

DANFORTH FOUNDATION GRANTS...The Danforth Foundation, St. Louis, Mo. recently declared its intention to increase support for the advanced education of able minority persons interested in preparing for careers in college teaching. A recommendation that the Danforth Graduate Fellowship Program offer approximately 100 fellowships for graduate education annually, with 25 of these awards designated for American Indians, Blacks, Mexican-Americans, and Puerto Ricans, will become effective in the 1976-77 academic year. The first appointees will enter graduate study in the fall of 1977. Fellowships are also open to all qualified persons who have serious interest in careers of teaching in colleges and universities, and who plan to study for a Ph.D. in any field of study common to the undergraduate liberal arts curriculum in the United States. GRANT AWARDED CARTER...The National Endowment for the Arts has awarded Warrick Carter (CCS) a jazz/folk/ethnic composition fellowship grant. The grant supports the commission of a series of three compositions for an instrumentation of chamber orchestra and jazz ensemble. Dr. Carter directs GSU's internationally-acclaimed jazz program, is secretary and treasurer of the National Association of Jazz Educators and national secretary of the Black Music Caucus.

POSTDOCTORAL RESEARCH OPPORTUNITIES...

The National Research Council has announced the NRC Research Associateship Programs for 1977. The programs include Atmospheric & Earth Sciences, Chemistry, Engineering, Environmental Sciences, Life Sciences, Mathematics, Physics, and Space Sciences. Appointments are awarded on a competitive basis to recent recipients of the doctorate and in some programs to senior investigators. Postmark deadline for applications is January 15, 1977. Awards will be announced in April. Also, the National Science Foundation has announced NATO postdoctoral Fellowships in Science for 1976-77 for persons planning to enter upon or continue postdoctoral study in the sciences, mathematical, physical, medical, biological, engineering, and social sciences. Closing date for submission of applications is Nov. 29, 1976. Announcement of awards to be made on or about April 15, 1977. For further info contact the Placement Office, ext. 2163.

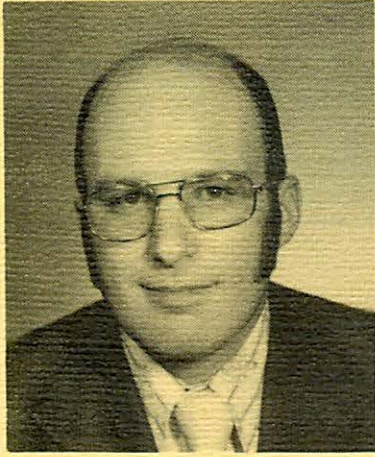
EDUCATION OF HANDICAPPED GRANT AVAILABLE...

The award is based on test samples of water which is used in the heating/cooling systems of the building.



FAZE FOCUS: DANIEL SWENSON

Dan Swenson, new BPS faculty member as of September, comes to GSU from Utah State University in Logan, Utah.

At Utah State he held the position of Lecturer in Business Education which included instruction in Business Communication Methods of Teaching and Business Ed Skill subjects.

Through various contacts he learned of GSU and its competency-based education - a topic of great interest to him. He was attracted by the tremendous challenge and opportunity to participate in "innovative education" as it is practiced at GSU.

Commenting on competency-based education he said, "With this program it is possible to identify learning--no other system can make that statement. It emphasizes intrinsic motivation; students can realize the skill they have achieved, they have a real hold on what they have learned."

Swenson is impressed with the student body at GSU. He likes the emphasis placed on direct communication with students. "Students here do not play games as sometimes happens in more traditional schools," he said. "It is easier to get honest feedback - if students are unhappy they say so, if they like something they tell you." He also enjoys working with students here because they are older and generally have some working experience.

In addition to his teaching duties in BPS, he is presently working on a textbook for business education - a business communication text, completely competency-based and featuring group processes.

Swenson received the Ed.D. in Curriculum Development and Supervision with special emphasis in Business Education from Utah State University in June, 1976, a M.S. in Business Administration from California State University, 1962, and a B.S. in Business Marketing, California State University in 1960.

He is single and resides in Richton Park.
