### PAYROLL CRISIS AVERTED . . .

On behalf of GSU employees, their families, and their mortgage holders, a special "thank you" is extended to the individuals who made the July 14 payroll possible in spite of Murphy's Law.

Between nine o'clock Monday morning and midnight Tuesday evening, Jeff Bushong (BO) and Lloyd Jones (CCC), labored 36 hours here at the University identifying and helping to correct computer programming problems not of their own making. At about midnight on Tuesday evening, Lloyd and Jeff, a little bleary-eyed and very tired, assembled the final payroll documents and turned them over to Bill Wickersham to be flown to Springfield and taken to the State of Illinois Comptroller's Office for processing early Wednesday morning.

All three BOG universities in the Chicago area were affected by these programming "bugs" and without the efforts of Jeff and Lloyd it was possible that all paychecks for employees of the three universities would be delayed.

Also assisting at various points throughout the crisis were the Business Office and Computer Center staff.

### GOOD NEWS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION . . .

On July 8, 1978 Gov. Thompson signed appropriation bills for higher education.

In 1979, the State of Illinois will devote \$960,330,550 to higher education--an appropriation 9.9 per cent over the figure for 1978.

The appropriations will provide for 8 per cent increases in university faculty salaries and 10 per cent for lower-paid civil servants. The appropriations will also provide money for an underfinanced retirement system, for more and larger scholarships, and for library materials.

A Chicago Tribune editorial attributed the progress of the increased appropriation to the excellent work of the Illinois Board of Higher Education.

Gov. Thompson said, "The funding levels for higher education I am approving represent the keeping of my pledge to make education my highest priority. Higher education is up almost 10 per cent."

### PRESIDENT RETURNS . . .

President Leo Goodman-Malamuth has returned from the 10th International Convention of the Communication Association of the Pacific in Tokyo where he delivered the keynote address. The president collected all papers presented at the conference. They are now available to the University community in the LRC.

Prominent jazz artists will conduct clinics, master classes, perform with students, and present a concert at the conclusion of the week. It is estimated that 700 students will receive direct benefit from the clinics and classes and more than 5,000 others will benefit from the concerts.

INTRODUCING THE  
INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC POLICY  
AND ADMINISTRATION . . .

A new program has begun at Governors State University. Titled The Institute for Public Policy and Administration the program is designed to serve the public sector needs of the community within the region served by GSU. Dr. Peter Colby, BPS professor is director of the Institute.

Dr. Colby states, "In this region there are thousands of individual government workers, elected officials and hundreds of autonomous local agencies. Each is unique, but all face similar administrative problems and public policy issues." Continuing, he said, "The Institute will be able to provide a rich opportunity for these elected officials, government employees and concerned citizens to deepen and broaden both their knowledge of government and their administrative skills."

A series of planning workshops will be held in the Fall, 1978 to implement the Institute's six-part program:

- Research conducted on issues important to the community.
- Seminars co-sponsored with community organizations.
- Courses designed to deal specifically with current government issues.
- Orientation programs for newly-elected public officials.
- Workshops for area government employees.
- Student internship programs.

Established in February, 1978, the Institute requested a Mini-grant which was awarded to fund two specific projects which would demonstrate the valuable role the Institute can play in the region.

The first major project was the two-day seminar "Making Government Work" recently presented at GSU. Keynote speakers United States Congressmen Edward J. Derwinski, Martin A Russo, and George M. O'Brien offered their views in short talks and extensive question and answer sessions on how government can be made to work better.
