# GSU CAMPUS HOSTS THE 'REAL' ENERGY INDEPENDENCE FAIR



Beth and Dan Halacy of Golden, Colorado will show how to make solar stoves and how to use them during Fair activities, August 22-25.

The excitement which kicked off at the Hantack House last week with the preparation for the erection of Jene Highstein's "Flying Saucer" sculpture continues to build. Twenty-one CETA trainees, four new full time solar trainers, and the University Energy Group are all at work ordering, building, evaluating, and testing equipment and other alternative energy contraptions that will be part of the 'Real' Energy Independence Fair at GSU, August 22-25.

According to Bethe Hagens, University Professor at GSU and a Fair coordinator, "The Fair is really the first of its kind anywhere, with operating low-cost solar and other renewable energy inventions actually powering the event itself." Included will be an array of 16 solar ovens along with assorted boilers, fryers, and steamers which will cook a good portion of food for the masses. A small photo cell factory will be in operation, producing electric power for its own soldering irons and putting the excess into the Fair's "mini-utility." A wind electric system is being installed especially for the event. Its power will be stored as back-up. Greenhouses, model wall sections, a giant solar balloon, some modest solar weapons, and dozens of home solar items are all in the makings. This event promises to be one of the more interesting energy extravanganzas likely to occur anywhere.

Complementing the fun and festivities are a series of workshops and courses which will be offered throughout the four-day event. learn how to build, operate and modify a solar oven; learn the

Those participating can: learn how to build, operate and modify a solar oven; learn the 2000-year history of solar architecture; find out how to compost home food garbage and turn it into potting soil with earthworms; see five or six different kinds of insulating window coverings that will save you substantial dollars on summer cooling and winter heating; see how to attach a solar water heater to your roof; play group games; help to build a small solar balloon; boil water with a fresnel lens. In short, participants will have the opportunity to "play" with some of the simple yet surprisingly powerful solar tools in this "campground to end all campgrounds."

Even if it's cloudy, solar skeptics will be surprised to find how much of the Fair's demon-

strations remain up and running. Joe Deahl will be driving his electric (photovoltaic-powered) car (shown on this page), rain or shine. He may get wet, but those photocells keep generating power even in the most diffuse light. Nonbelievers should attend and see for themselves!

The Fair admission price is just \$2 per day, with children under age 10 admitted free. Highlights such as the Flea Market, Energy Inventors Round-up, and the Parade of Alternative Bikes and Vehicles will punctuate each day's routine. Schedules are posted throughout the University.
