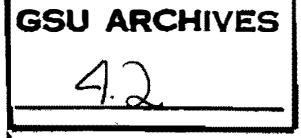

THE OFFICE FOR ECONOMIC EDUCATION . . . at Governors State University has been approved by the Illinois Council on Economic Education. The announcement was made by President Leo Goodman-Malamuth. Only seven other Illinois universities have approved centers for economic education. The centers are established in accordance with the Joint Council on Economic Education in New York which provides teachers, educational personnel and the general public with a greater understanding of economics through teaching materials, special programs and guidance/training sessions. John S. Morton has been appointed as the Director of the Office for Economic Education, according to BPA Dean Robert Milam. Morton, formerly a Community Professor of Economics at GSU, is a Ph.D. candidate at the University of Chicago. He earned an M.A. in social science from the University of Illinois and a B.A. in social studies from Miami (Ohio) University.

GSU FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATORS . . . are requested to submit papers presenting their views, opinions and ideas on the definition of liberal education and its implementation at GSU. Selected papers are to be presented at the Academic Convocation being planned by the Faculty Senate as a colloquium to address the issue of liberal education at GSU. # Mini-Grant Series Fund

MINI-GRANT SERIES FUND for Cycle 2, 1980  
Office of Research Deadline: (5:00 p.m.) October 1, 1980

The Governors State University Mini-Grant Series Fund was established by the Office of Research to encourage and assist the Governors State University community in conducting projects related to research and other creative activities that will enable the institution to better achieve its goal, fulfill its mission and to seed such projects.

## WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Governors State University faculty, professional staff, and students (sponsored by a faculty member) are eligible to submit applications and receive financial support from the Mini-Grant Series Fund.

## TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR CONSIDERATION, A PROJECT MUST SHOW EVIDENCE OF THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA:

- .the potential of the proposed project for subsequent external support
- .the previous efforts of the applicant to secure external funding
- .the clarity and quality of the project description: needs statement, measurable objectives, procedures of implementation, and evaluation/ dissemination plan
- .the appropriateness of the requested resources to the proposed work, and
- .the experience and qualifications of the applicant(s) to perform the proposed work.

In general, the Mini-Grant Series Fund will accept all applications submitted provided the respective Division and College support the application. Some Divisions and/or Colleges may elect not to support noncontinuing and instructor level faculty members. Interested faculty should check with their respective Division and College to determine their position on this matter.

Questions and correspondence concerning application procedures or actual applications should be directed to Sheadrick A. Tillman IV, Chairperson, Mini-Grant Series Fund Review Committee, Office of Research (x2215). It is inappropriate for applicants to direct inquiries to members of the Review Committee concerning the status or disposition of an application.

The Mini-Grant Series Fund invitations will be conducted each Trimester, therefore, please note the schedule for proposal submission, notification and project initiation:

October 1 (Cycle 2)	November 15	January 1 - May 15
February 1 (Cycle 3)	March 15	May 16 - August 15
June 1 (Cycle 1)	July 15	August 16 - December 31
