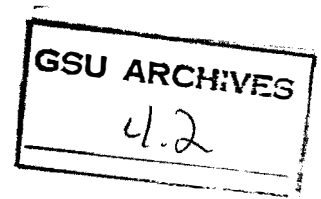

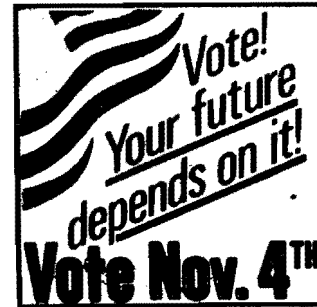

A VERY SPECIAL ARTS FESTIVAL . . . will be held at Governors State University Friday, November 7, when about 1,000 handicapped young people will gather to enjoy comedy, music, drama, dance, painting, sculpture, and other art forms. The festival, called "A Rainbow of the Arts," is being sponsored by SPEED Developmental Center in Chicago Heights and GSU, in cooperation with the National Committee of Arts for the Handicapped and the Illinois State Board of Education.

The workshop is being sponsored by the South Suburban FOCUS Council, the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, and the Institute for Public Policy and Administration of GSU. The keynote speaker will be Mort Kaplan of Mort Kaplan and Associates advertising agency of Chicago, who will address the topic "Creating a Community Image." This all-day workshop is part of a series of seminars on leadership and management being sponsored by GSU. TAKE TIME TO VIEW . . . segments of the upcoming seven-part series on breast cancer, to be shown on the 5 p.m. and 10 p.m. newscasts on WMAQ-TV, November 5, 6, 7, and 9. Volunteers of the Y-Me Breast Cancer Support Program, co-founded by Mimi Kaplan (UL) and Ann Marcou (GSU alumna), were asked to appear on the program along with their medical advisors, Dr. Richard Desser and Dr. Arthur Michel. A lengthy interview with Marcou is to be included. Kaplan may be spotted as a chemotherapy patient being interviewed by Dr. Desser ("If you look fast," Mimi adds).

Y-Me was started in June, 1978 in Park Forest with 12 women attending the first meeting. It now has over 400 members and covers the entire metropolitan Chicago area. The program offers trained peer counseling through a hotline, educational workshops and conferences, rap sessions, and individual counseling. Selected to participate in a pilot program in the south suburbs by the Illinois Division of the American Cancer Society, Y-Me volunteers are now in contact with breast cancer patients at seven hospitals, enabling patients to receive information on chemotherapy and reconstruction from another woman who has undergone similar treatment.

AN OPEN LETTER . . . to the GSU Community from Szabo Food Service: "All of us are concerned with the cost of living and how it directly affects us each day. While we may see our salaries increase from year to year, we also experience increases in the things we must purchase for our homes and families. We at Szabo see the same increases as you do. Costs for staples, such as sugar, meat and other foodstuffs, as well as labor, have increased during this past 12 months. While some price increases have been implemented during this time, there has been no general price increase applied in our food service operations; however, we now are faced with the situation of meeting these costs head-on while still providing a reasonable and effective food service program for you. The price increases scheduled for next week reflect this commitment and effort from Szabo Food Service. We regret the need to increase our prices."
